

International Institute at a Glance

The Institute builds vibrant, inclusive communities in New England and welcomes 1,700 new Americans each year to Massachusetts and New Hampshire. Our services include resettlement, case management, adult education, job training and placement, and pathways to citizenship.

2016 Key Accomplishments

- The Institute resettled 623 refugees in Eastern Massachusetts and Southern New Hampshire, representing 25% of all refugees resettled in those two states.
- Refugees served by the Institute fled violence and persecution in 20 countries, including Afghanistan, Bhutan, Burma (Myanmar), the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Eritrea, Iraq, Somalia, Sudan, and Syria.
- The Institute served almost 500 people in its English language and English for Employment programs.
- The Institute provided employment counseling services to 686 refugee and immigrant clients across all three sites, 71% of whom received a job placement within six months of starting the program.
- IINE staff placed new Americans at more than 146 companies across Massachusetts and New Hampshire. The Institute's job preparation and placement services were critical to the economic growth of a region with low unemployment and significant labor shortages.

Virginia Prescott Virginia Prescott is the Gracie Award-winning host of NHPR's Word of Mouth radio program, the Writers on a New England Stage series, Civics 101 and 10-Minute Writers Workshop podcasts. Word of Mouth is a daily break from breaking news and home to new ideas and under-reported stories from viral and pop culture. Prior to joining NHPR, she was editor, producer and director for NPR's On Point and Here & Now programs, and directed interactive media for WNYC in New York. Throughout her radio career, she's helped build independent radio stations throughout the developing world and trained journalists in post-conflict zones from Sierra Leone to the Balkans. Her commitment to the power of sound and story-telling led her to create audio installations in Houston, Watertown, Massachusetts, and at MIT. She was awarded a Loeb Fellowship at Harvard University and was a member of the Peabody Award-winning production team for Jazz from Lincoln Center with Ed Bradley. She is the recipient of a Gracie Award for Outstanding Host and loves working in radio, but regrets that so many good outfits go unnoticed.

Meet the Storytellers

Ewa Chrusciel

Ewa Chrusciel is a poet, teacher, and translator. She has three books of poems in English: Of Annunciations (Omnidawn 2017), Contraband of Hoopoe (Omnidawn 2014), Strata (Emergency Press 2009), as well as three books in Polish: Tobołek, Sopiłki, Furkot. Her newest book "Of Annunciations" is a series of prayers, laments, and lullabies addressing our current migration crises. Annunciation becomes a symbol of the "yes" when confronted with exiles, and strangers. What does it mean to say "yes" to a stranger? Ewa also translated selected books by Jack London, Joseph Conrad, I.B. Singer, as well as selected poems by Jorie Graham, Kazim Ali, Lyn Hejinian, Cole Swensen, and other American poets into Polish. She is an Associate Professor of Humanities at Colby-Sawyer College.

Ed Fayle

Storyteller Ed Fayle delights audiences with original tales, layering warmth and mirth during performances accompanied by guitar and harmonica. An English teacher in Mount Washington Valley, Ed earned his Master of Fine Arts in creative writing from Emerson College. He was selected to the New Hampshire State Library Artist Roster, performing summer reading programs in libraries statewide. His dramatic rendition of Chris Van Allsburg's award-winning picture book, The Polar Express, has long been recognized as a holiday treasure. He is also a feature teller at the Corner House Inn storytelling events. Ed lives with his wife and two children on a mountainside farm in Tamworth, New Hampshire.

Tilak Niroula

Born in Bhutan, Tilak Niroula lived in exile in Nepal for two decades before resettling to Manchester, New Hampshire with the International Institute of New England's support in 2013. Upon arrival, Tilak secured a job as the Media and Communication Manager with the Bhutanese Community of New Hampshire (BCNH), a vibrant community based non-profit organization. He also founded 'Hamro Aawaz' a popular Nepali show on Concord TV Channel 22 that raises awareness about the challenges faced by the Bhutanese community in diaspora. Tilak has written extensively on refugee issues. In 2017, the New Hampshire Union Leader recognized him as one of the '40 Under Forty' recipients. Tilak is still employed with BCNH and also serves as a residential instructor at Easter Seals.

Kayla Rossmeissl

Kayla Rossmeissl has worked for IINE-Manchester as an adult English teacher and citizenship preparation instructor for two years. If you've ever observed her class, you will see the joy in her eyes and hear the love she has for each student through her positive demeanor. While teaching is her profession, she is also pursuing her master's in TESOL at Southern New Hampshire University, serves as a master's assistant tutoring international students, and aids in aligning curriculum to the college and career readiness standards. Before the International Institute, Kayla served as a Peace Corps volunteer in China as an ESL Instructor for a university of a "small" farm town in the Sichuan Province. Even though she grew up in Florida, she loves her home in New Hampshire where she enjoys multi-day hikes, rock climbing, traveling, making things with her hands, and spending time with her husband and two fur-children, Sam and Jude.

Theresa Okokon

Theresa Okokon is a Wisconsin native, social worker, yoga teacher, and storyteller. After performing at IINE's "Suitcase Stories LIVE!" event in Arlington, Massachusetts this past May, Theresa joined the International Institute's development team as a gift processor. Theresa is also the founder and director of LEGIT.yoga, which provides trauma-informed yoga to individuals who are homeless, low-income, or otherwise marginalized and disenfranchised. A feature storyteller throughout greater Boston, Theresa was selected as one of two hosts for the televised WGBH series *Stories from the Stage* in May 2017.

Abdullah Kashmoola

Abdullah Kashmoola was born and raised in Iraq, and lived in Egypt for 10 years before resettling to the United States with the assistance from the International Institute of New England in September 2015. Currently, Abdullah is a full-time student at Manchester Community College majoring in computer science, in addition to working full-time as a garage attendant. He loves technology and likes to remain current on all emerging products and software. He also likes music, movies and spending as much time on the beach as possible.

Emma Tobin

Emma Tobin was born in Massachusetts, grew up in New Hampshire, and considers herself to be "from" both places. She has worked with refugees and immigrants in many parts of the world including her two home states, India, England, and along the Thai-Burma border. She has also worked with marginalized communities in Nepal. She has held positions with World Education, Inc., Harvard School of Public Health, and is the former Associate Director of the Organization for Refugee and Immigrant Success in Manchester, NH. Emma loves writing, traveling, being an anthropology geek, and all things spicy. She is honored to serve as Program Director for the International Institute of New England – Lowell.

Deo Mwano

Originally from the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Deo Mwano is an innovative, multi-cultural leader in education, organizational leadership, and social justice. He teaches people to follow a path of self-improvement and dedication to others. Growing up during a violent civil war, Deo became the patriarch of the family at the age of nine. In 2000, Deo, his mother, and his three younger brothers resettled to the United States where they participated in IINE's programming in Manchester. A gifted performer and presenter, Deo's talents have been featured at Yale University, The Moth, TEDxAmoskeag Millyard, and more. Deo has worked at Southern New Hampshire University (SNHU) College For America and managed Kepler University partnership, bringing SNHU education to students in Rwanda. He holds a B.A. in International Relations and History and a MBA in Strategic Leadership. Deo was also a '40 Under 40' recipient.
